Besides the obvious moral imperative the expectation of health care also makes society more enjoyable and productive since people can more readily return to socializing, child care and work after being sick or needing to care for a sick relative and stress and the spread of diseases is reduced. Your previous changes have had the predicted effects with higher premiums, fewer people insured, more confusion over what is covered and fewer early cancer diagnoses. The latest change will continue along this destructive spiral.
